

# Third Sunday In Advent

In Christianity, we hear often about the "Good News." We might often associate it with Jesus' compassion to the poor, his healings and miracles, and the salvation he won for us. In today's Gospel, we read of John the Baptist. "Exhorting them in many other ways, he preached good news to the people." Yet as we examine the rest of the reading, we see examples of John's preaching. If you have two cloaks, give one away. Don't cheat others out of their money, extort, or lie. And, of course, the warning that the Messiah is on the move and "his winnowing fan is in his hand to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his barn, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire." Merry Christmas?

Not only do John's listeners enjoy his message, but they seem to think he might be the awaited Messiah! To understand today's Gospel, it's important to understand the Jewish people. For most of their history, God's chosen people had been under someone else's heel. They were slaves in Egypt. Their kingdoms were ravaged first by the Assyrians, then the Babylonians. Now they were under the yoke of the Roman Empire. Familiar with being strangers in a strange land, welcoming the stranger, caring for the vulnerable, and enacting justice was incredibly important to them as a people. While John's words may seem odd or strong to our modern ears, this call to justice was welcome, even if it was directed at the hearer.

The truth is, no one is exempt from John's call to repentance. We all have further to go in the Christian life. We can all grow in virtue and love our neighbors more generously. The Church gives us the Advent season to examine our own hearts. Did any of John's warnings resonate with you? That could be a great thing to bring to Jesus this week!

### Dear Parishioners,

**"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice! The Lord is near."** These words, from Philippians 4: 4-5, form the entrance antiphon at

Mass this weekend, the Third Sunday of Advent. Traditionally, this Sunday is called Gaudate Sunday ("Gaudate" is the Latin word for "rejoice" that is used in the antiphon). When we light the third candle on the Advent wreath, it is rose colored, as are the vestments worn by the priest at Mass. What does all this mean? Is the change in color just a signal that Christmas is fast approaching and we are running out of time to shop? Hopefully, it means much more than that.

The season of Advent is a time of expectation, anticipation, and preparation. We are called to turn away from sin and to prepare our hearts for the long awaited Messiah. This Sunday helps us to remember that our preparation is not for an event to be feared, but for one that is the source of our joy. All too often, we can lose sight of this and our "holiday season" is anything but joyous. Let us all remember that the time of the Lord's arrival is near; and, as people who are prepared to receive Him, let us rejoice and show the world what the real joy of the season is. "**Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice! The Lord is near.**"

If we have let the first weeks of Advent pass us by without taking the time to be renewed and strengthened in spirit, to truly prepare for the celebration of the Lord's birth, it is not too late. Perhaps this week we can all set aside a few extra minutes each day for prayer. If we haven't celebrated the Sacrament of Penance to prepare our hearts to receive Christ, maybe we can take the time this week. On Monday evening (December 17th) the Diocese of Syracuse will be participating in the Light is On for You Campaign. Priests will be hearing confessions in churches throughout the diocese from 4-7PM. I will be hearing confessions at Our Lady of Pompei/St. Peter. Confessions are also scheduled Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, December 18, 20 and 21 from 4:30-6:00 at Our Lady of Pompei/St. Peter. Let us all take time to be reconciled to the Lord and to each other as we prepare to celebrate the dawn of our Salvation.

Please know that you are in my prayers during these holy days of Advent; please keep me in yours.

# Joseph's House


