From Fr. Brendan Foley

It's hard to believe that we've arrived at the month of November, which means the end of another liturgical calendar year is just a few weeks away. I'd like us to listen with renewed interest to the Sunday Gospel readings over the next few weeks as they will draw us into the ultimate realities of our life: heaven and hell, death and judgment—we should especially note Jesus' teachings and what our response must be. Today's gospel may have a more of a hidden connection to these, but there is clearly an important message. As St. John of the Cross says, at the end of our life, we will be judged on how we have loved.

While initially hearing about these subjects can make us uncomfortable, simply engaging Jesus' words and remembering his desire for us to live with him forever can change that perspective from subconscious anxiety to abiding and liberating peace.

A simple place to start in assessing ourselves and our relationship with the Lord is laid out before us today:

The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart...soul...and mind...and your neighbor as your-self.

The Lord asks this of us not because He will get something out of it for himself, but rather because following after the life he calls us to is actually intended toward our greatest fulfillment. Following his commandments isn't just a good thing to do because he says it's a good thing to do. In reality living others-focused and giving of ourselves to God and neighbor actually gives us life, it does not take it away. It's a beautiful paradox of our faith. The more we give love away the more we end up encountering it for ourselves.

But of course our efforts to live following this path can only bear fruit when we first look to the One who is the source of this radical form of love. Each of us must come to receive first the tremendously deep love that God has for each one of us, that we are indeed seen and known by him. And it can sometimes sound trite or cliche but this love is powerful and only once we have truly experienced being loved by God, once we've received his personal delighting in us, that our hearts can be oriented away from ourselves and toward God and neighbor.

The Saints who we just celebrated on Friday show us how transformative of an encounter with the life and love of God can be. What would happen if you responded more to the promptings of God's grace and friendship?

One of my favorite lines that comes up regularly in the Divine Office/Liturgy of the Hours, is a line from the book of revelation that references the lives of certain disciples who lived courageously the life of the Gospel while eventually losing their lives for it. "Love for life did not deter them from death..." (Rev. 12:11). It captures a holy boldness and freedom that is offered to us when we live perpetually from a place of gratitude and desire to stay in relationship with the Lord. It implies that while alive on earth we are called not to hate or completely remove ourselves from this world, but live and embrace the reality that we were made for something more, something which is beyond the comprehension of our mind. But we can trust in the One who still chose to bless us with experiencing His love in many ways here and now, which is what moves us toward Thanksgiving. Inspired to live and love wholly for the Lord, may we be people of hope that draw others with us, in peace, toward eternity.

One who has truly been changed by encountering the Lord knows what it means to live for Him with the entirety of one's being: heart, mind, soul, and strength.


A Family Perspective Family Life Education

I didn't realize how much my arms would hurt when I became a

It occurred to me first during Mass when my daughter was just a few weeks old. She was the kind of kid who could only sleep in someone's arms. I desperately wanted her to stay quiet during the service, so I held the swaddled bundle in front of me like it was a bomb, not daring to move. By the homily, my arms were on fire.

I quickly realized this was a common scenario of my new life as a parent. Holding, rocking, bouncing, restraining, dragging honestly, my weak little chicken-arms had never been worked out like this before. It took all my strength.

But isn't that the way it is with everything that's worthwhile? It takes all your strength. Not some of it. Not most of it. All of it.

I am a fairly active Catholic. My faith impacts a lot of areas of my life. But there are still boundaries that I've drawn around God. There are places I haven't let Him in. Things I keep "for myself." Experiences that are just so full of me, so full of my own plans and my own desires.

But God desires everything. Not because He is selfish, but because He is good, and wise. Because He knows that the places we keep from Him will become filled with something else. He wants to get there first. He wants to lay His claim.

He wants all our strength. All our heart. All our soul. All our mind. Not most of it. All of it.
