

From Fr. Brendan Foley

Beautiful detail in our first reading today that might otherwise be missed...we have from the first book of Kings the story of the prophet Elijah and the Widow of Zarephath. It is a story, much like that in our Gospel today, that exhibits an expression of deep faith. Faith, as we know, is much more than just memorizing parts of a creed, or observing traditions, or having a supportive community around us. Faith takes the form of trust. As disciples, we have faith in someone, someone who knows

us, who constantly sustains us in being. Expressions of faith are expressions of confidence and trust in God, in the goodness of God, and the power that God has to not only provide for us but also to draw us deeper into communion and relationship with Him. I know you know this!

So what is going on in our first reading? Well, the Widow "of Zarephath" reveals to us that she is a Gentile-meaning she is outside of the relationship with God's covenant people. She would have no knowledge of the God and Lord on whose behalf Elijah is an instrument. So the request of her to provide for Elijah becomes even more removed from something she would ever want to do. She states very openly that in this time of drought and famine, all she has is the very little in her possession that will provide barely enough for her and her son to eat. As a result, Elijah asking for some sustenance is also asking her to give from what she really doesn't have to give. Yet, somehow she obliges Elijah's request. Where does her faith and ability to trust come from?

Elijah simply implores her: "Do not be afraid" and assures her that the Lord, the God of Israel, would provide for her and her son. Amazingly, she trusts. When it seems like she has absolutely nothing, that she has somehow prepared for the reality of her coming death, the sadness that she and her son are in desperation and have nothing left, and who knows, probably grief that she couldn't do more for herself and her son—in the face of this heaviness and despair, she makes a bold act of faith, she chooses to trust a God she hardly knows.

What about us? What about us who have been in relationship with this same God for years or even all our life? What kinds of acts of trust and faith are we willing to make when we find ourselves feeling the weight of being destitute in one way or another. In the face of isolation or loneliness, in material poverty, in poverty of health, in crises of fear, anxiety, or doubt-can we give to the Lord from what we perceive as us not even having? Can we offer our trust that the Lord can provide? Let's ask the Lord to increase our faith, and give him freedom to surprise us. Let's also trust that what God provides is precisely what we need, and that God alone is truly the best defender of our hearts, our lives, his Church and the world, and that his divine wisdom is always worth our trust.



(Practicing) Catholic -Recognize God In Your **Ordinary Moments** By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman **Giving From Abundance**

If you're like me, and you're far, far below the "having buildings named after you" tax bracket, you might just think that today's Gospel has nothing to do with you.

You might kick back and relax, thinking of all the poor, rich suckers sitting in the pews, shifting uncomfortably as Jesus praises the meager gift of the widow and disdains those who only give from abundance, those whose charity results in admiration and praise and all manner of temporal reward.

"In this economy, every gift I give is from my poverty," you might think to yourself with a chuckle.

But you — and let me be clear, I'm talking mostly to myself here - would be wrong. Because we all have an abundance of something, even if it isn't money.

What I've come to realize about myself is that I find plenty of ways to give only from my abundance. For instance, if I answer any request with the words, "Sure, I can, but..." chances are high that I'm about to work out a way to give, but *only* in a way that doesn't really impact me.

I'm willing to help. I just don't want to feel it.

But here's the thing about Jesus: he cares what's in our hearts as well as what's in our hands. A good deed, an act of charity? That's great! But what's the story behind it? Because a world full of moral actions and selfish hearts doesn't do anyone any good.

When we give from our poverty — our poverty of money, our poverty of time, our poverty of patience — we are giving the gift of the widow. ©LPi


