

From Fr. Brendan Foley

"...the wise shall shine brightly like the splendor of the firmament, and those who lead the many to justice shall be like the stars forever" (Daniel 12:3). But what does it mean to be wise? Considering Jesus' words today in the Gospel, it might be rather daunting to imagine all the phenomena he describes...sun and moon darkening, stars falling, heaven and earth passing away. Add to it from our first reading, too: "it shall be a time unsurpassed in distress." Recall the end of our liturgical calendar behaving up anter into reflection on the "last things" of heaven hell death and indemnet.

calendar helping us enter into reflection on the "last things" of heaven, hell, death, and judgment, all of which we uphold as real and deserving of our attention. To be wise then, we could equate, means to be prepared or to have awareness of the coming of these things and live accordingly. And to be sure, what we really await *are new heavens and a new earth*.

A couple of takeaways. One of the things that Jesus assures is that unlike the sun, the moon, or the earth, his word *will* not pass away—which is another invitation for us to take seriously our relationship with Sacred Scripture and its effects on our lives. Truth in the wisdom of God is worth our absolute everything, we can always be more submerged in God's word. Ignorance or failure to live out God's word has implications for us. As a result, if we want to be among the wise in God's eyes, we should strive to be nourished daily by God's word.

It's not comfortable for us to reflect on the potential purification or even punishment that could come to us as a result of our attentiveness (or lack thereof) to Jesus and his word. Many in our culture would probably take offense at the idea that there could be hell while simul-taneously having the existence of a merciful God who is Love. So we need to remember that hell is a self-chosen state. Heaven is a kingdom of love, of truth, and of humility. But this kind of love is self-giving, not selfish. The way we love God, others, and self reflects our attention to eternal life. Some helpful guidance from the Catechism on the subject...

"We cannot be united with God unless we freely choose to love him. But we cannot love God if we sin gravely against him, against our neighbor or against ourselves: 'He who does not love remains in death. Anyone who hates his brother is a murderer, and you know that no murderer has eternal life abiding in him' (1 Jn. 3:14-15). Our Lord warns us that we shall be separated from him if we fail to meet the serious needs of the poor and the little ones who are his brethren (Mt 25:31-46). To die in mortal sin without repenting and accepting God's merciful love means remaining separated from him for ever by our own free choice. This state of definitive self-exclusion from communion with **God and the blessed is called "hell"** (CCC1033). God predestines no one to go to hell; for this, a willful turning away from God is necessary, and persistence in it until the end (CCC1037)." Meaning if we strive to stay faithful to the means that the Lord himself has left us (i.e. Prayer and Sacred Scripture, the Church, the Sacraments, etc.), he will never abandon us and he will bring us deeper into his merciful heart. The Lord does not force us to respond to his invitation, we are called to follow in freedom of heart. Thus, those who are wise in seeking that which is our eternal inheritance internalize and live as our Psalm today instructs...may the Lord provide each of us such a grace:

"I set the LORD ever before me; with him at my right hand I shall not be disturbed.

Therefore my heart is glad and my soul rejoices, my body, too, abides in confidence; because you will not abandon my soul to the netherworld, nor will you suffer your faithful one to undergo corruption. You will show me the path to life, fullness of joys in your presence, the delights at your right hand forever." (Psalm 16).


