From Fr. Brendan Foley

The Liturgical calendar year effectively concludes with the feast we celebrate today, "Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe," and I think it always offers us an invitation to renewal in our walks with the Lord. With Advent just days away, we begin again to journey together as a Church, seeking again to enter deeper into the life of Christ, and to allow Him to have pride of place in our hearts over and above all else. Contrary to what the world might expect, this humility before Jesus doesn't leave us denying everything in life, but rather it leads us to receive true freedom. This freedom that only Jesus offers

is meant to enliven and animate us, because with his Spirit giving us life, it is Jesus who can then live and move in us.

Reflecting with Jesus as our King, we should consider putting in some effort toward self-evaluation—how am I living in relationship with God, with my neighbor, and with myself? Is it reflective of Jesus being King of everything in my life? The implications of this feast remind us that if Jesus is King and Lord of the universe, then I am not. It means that my life really isn't about me—but again rather than this being a message of slavery or denial, it's so much more an exciting adventure. Do I really allow Jesus to have governing authority over my heart and my life? Whom (or maybe what) do you serve? Do you prioritize serving yourself and your own designs, or do you strive to live humbly under the care of Jesus our King? In our sinfulness and weaknesses we continually struggle to do this, which is why I think the placement of this feast on the cusp of a new calendar is the invitation we all need to continue to go deeper.

Our readings today present us with the perspective that Jesus is no typical king, and he certainly doesn't govern like we might expect the kings of the world. He himself takes initiative and seeks out 'his subjects' (those entrusted to him) and desires their wellbeing and fulfillment. He embodies the reality of his words that echo his desire to come to us, not to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for us. His crown is a crown of thorns, and his throne is the altar of the Cross.

If we allow him to really be Lord of our lives, we can trust that we shall not be left orphaned or left wanting. For he exalts and lifts up those who are bowed down. What are you waiting for?! Let Jesus be King of your heart and of your life; you will come to know the untouchable freedom of the sons and daughters of God. His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not be taken away, his kingship shall not be destroyed.

Soon to be canonized Saint in 2025, Carlo Acutis (1991-2006), is someone who certainly lived allowing Jesus to be King of his heart. From a merely worldly perspective his life might seem tragic or devastating



having died so young, but to know him is to know that is so far from the truth. Carlo died with no worldly success to his name, vet here we are, aware of what a tremendous impact his life has had and continues to have on the Church and the world. He is an inspiration for all of us in our apparent ordinary lives striving for everyday holiness. Consider some of the key pieces of his life:

- Carlo was diagnosed with leukemia as a teenager. Before his • death in 2006, he offered his sufferings for Pope Benedict XVI and for the Church
- From a young age, Carlo had a special love for God, even though his parents weren't especially devout. Antonia Salzano, his mom, said that before Carlo, she went to Mass only for her first Communion, her confirmation, and her wedding. But as a young child, Carlo loved to pray the rosary. After he made his first Communion, he went to Mass as often as possible at the parish. Carlo's love for the Eucharist also inspired a deep conversion for his mother.
- Carlo was a faithful friend. He was known for standing up for kids at school who got bullied, especially kids with disabilities. When a friend's parents were getting a divorce, Carlo made a special effort to include his friend in the Acutis' family life. With his friends, he spoke about the importance of going to Mass and confession, human dignity, and chastity.
- His spiritual director has attested that Carlo was personally • convinced that the scientific evidence from Eucharistic miracles would help people to realize that Jesus is really present in the Eucharist and come back to Mass.
- Carlo loved playing video games. His mother recalls that he liked Nintendo Game Boy and GameCube as well as PlayStation and Xbox. He had conversations with his gaming buddies about the importance of going to Mass and confession and limited his video game playing to no more than two hours per week. Carlo also liked Spider-Man and Pokémon.
- Carlo constructed a website (you can still visit it today) to chronicle and share the miracles that have happened as a result of the Eucharist throughout the world so that we may grow in appreciation for the unfathomable goodness that is Jesus's body, blood, soul, and divinity present and alive in the Eucharist.

We are blessed to be able to host a small portion of his exhibit in the Church. Nov. 24th & Dec. 1st, possibly Dec. 8th as well. You will definitely want to budget some additional time to explore these weekends. More information to come! There is a lot to read and absorb...so take your time and visit today, and next Sunday, too.

I read an article, years ago, about an American filmmaker who decided to step away from a wildly successful film franchise that had been requiring him and his family to live abroad.

It stuck in my mind because of the tongue-in-cheek reasoning he gave for the surprising decision, "My kids were starting to speak in British accents."

Sometimes, we just want to go home, don't we?

Returning from a recent family vacation, I burst into tears at the airport, overcome with relief when I saw my sister's van pulling into the pickup lane. It didn't matter that I had had fun on this trip and that I was even looking forward to taking another one. In that moment, I was so tired, and all I wanted was my own bed. The smell of my own house. The feeling of not being "away."

If Jesus is our king, and his kingdom is not of this world, then we live our lives as perpetual aliens. This should reassure us in some ways. The world so often feels cold and cruel and strange to us because it is. We were not made for this world. We were made for heaven. We were made to yearn for the face, the presence, the protection of our King.

But this understanding of ourselves as strangers in a foreign land should also be a caution to us.

We can't get too comfortable here. We cannot become too wrapped up in the world and its temptations, its rewards, its comforts. We cannot start speaking in the language, the accent of our adopted homeland. Not if we ever want to return home and belong there.


worth keeping in sight all year round. Spread the word! Limited quantity available! Ornaments will be available soon.
