# From Fr. Brendan Foley

How beautiful and how needed is St. Paul's prayer for us today, I join my prayers to his for all of us: "I pray always with joy in my every prayer for all of you, because of your partnership for the gospel from the first day until now.

I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Christ Jesus.

...And this is my prayer: that your love may increase ever more and more in knowledge and every kind of perception, to discern what is of value, so that you may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ"— such a timely prayer, too, with a full week of Advent under our belts. No matter how long each of us have been on our journeys of faith or living as disciples, we all should trust that the Lord is accomplishing a "good work" in each of us. This side of heaven we are always incomplete, still a work in progress, still being transformed by grace, and in the process of being made perfect. Maybe this seems hard to believe or too good to be true. Baptism bestowed upon us an identity to share and receive the divine life of God within our broken humanity, to heal us, to restore, and to make whole again. This is incredibly good news. We are not left on our own but rather the closeness of God's life is offered to us in real intimacy. God's grace is tangibly and powerfully offered to us in the Sacraments, and additionally God is not restricted in how he bestows his grace—meaning every time he moves us to prayer, we are able to receive transformative grace to continue the "good work" in us that the Lord is accomplishing. The catch is that God doesn't force this transformation on us. In his mercy he invites our free participation in this work, and our response to his love and his grace matters. If we want healing, if we want strength, if we want renewed virtue, we must freely choose to respond and show up in prayer each day.

What are the implications of our preparedness or attentiveness to this call? Again the "good work" the Lord began for us in Baptism was not merely good for us in ourselves. The fruit of the life of grace alive in us is always more so intended to bless others around us more than just ourselves. In a sense, we can easily say that the world is significantly poorer when you and I turn in on ourselves and neglect our own striving for holiness because our participation with the Lord's grace is stunted and no longer serves to build up his body around us. Remember his freely given graces and blessings to us as individuals are intended to uplift his Body the Church in the world.

Another way we might say this, is our personal taking the journey of Advent seriously has a great effect on those around us. The prayer-fulness and silence that I cultivate produces charity for those around me. Going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation brings not only for-giveness for my sins and healing for me, but also breeds mercy to be extended through my life to others. St John the Baptist is such a pivotal figure that exemplifies this truth. The Lord called him to an important good work: that of preparing the arrival of the Lord and pointing out that he is the Messiah not only to those around him, but the Lord's grace upon him has now produced tremendous fruit that blesses us who also now behold the Lamb of God having known and recognized his arrival. May we be disposed to receive newness of grace to respond to the good work that the Lord is accomplishing in each of us this Advent, and by doing so may the Lord's work of holiness in us be a gift to those around us.




## **All Faith Food Pantry**

Reflect: Readings and Gospel 2nd Sunday of Advent



# (Practicing) Catholic -Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman The Straight Path



Ten to fifteen years ago the Department of Transportation decided that it would be fun to give everyone in my zip code something to complain about and replaced most of our major intersections with roundabouts.

This wouldn't be so irksome, I suppose, if I understood how to navigate a roundabout. In theory I do, I've read all the rules and I've watched those cute little YouTube videos where they show you which car is supposed to go at what time. But theory and practice are rather different. And the bottom line is, I never approach a roundabout without taking a deep, anxious breath and tightening my grip on the steering wheel, not entirely sure what my next move should be.

I think of roundabouts every time I hear today's Gospel reading, where John the Baptist echoes Isaiah in beseeching us to make straight the paths of the Lord. See, I always think I've made a straight path between me and God. I go to Mass. I go to Confession. I say my prayers.

He can get to me if He wants, I tell myself.

But without realizing it, I put up roundabouts. I make rules. *You go here, God, and then I go here. I'll do this, God, but first You do this.* You stay in your lane, and I stay in mine. Eventually I find myself taking a different route altogether; the road that stretches between me and Him is too daunting. I start avoiding it.

Sometimes I think God wants the path to be straight not for Himself but for us. He can handle a roundabout. But He knows that when we must run to Him, we have to do it without thinking. In the dark. In fear, in anxiety.
