From Fr. Brendan Foley

Exodus Chapter 3 (our first reading today) offers us a remarkable gift. While we are usually familiar with this story, we can easily take for granted its implications. Moses encounters the Lord who speaks to him through the burning bush—a bush out in the wilderness that is engulfed in flames, yet the bush remains unharmed, unburned, not scorched. It is from this encounter that the Lord sends Moses to be his instrument of liberation for His enslaved and oppressed people in Egypt. Moses also

asks the Lord for his name—and the Lord responds! God allows himself to be known by name!

"By revealing his Name," Pope Benedict XVI says, "God establishes a relationship between himself and us. He enables us to invoke him, he enters into relations with us and gives us the possibility of being in a relationship with him. This means that God gives himself, in a certain way, to our human world, becoming accessible, as if he were one of us. He faces the risk of the relationship, of being with us. What began in the burning bush in the desert is accomplished in the burning bush of the Cross where God, having become accessible in his Son made man, really became one of us, is put into our hands and, in this way, realizes the liberation of humanity. On Golgotha, God, who during the night of the flight from Egypt revealed himself as the One who frees us from slavery, revealed himself as the One who embraces every human being with the saving power of the Cross and the Resurrection and liberates him from sin and death, accepts him in the embrace of his love."

Ultimately what we gain from the Pope's thoughtful reflection is that God—who is all powerful—chose to humbly enter into our existence in a way that doesn't crush or destroy us, but rather comes within us and among us. He illumines us and as a result his light can shine through us. Like the burning bush, God sets us aflame in a manner that doesn't leave us burned but rather makes us fully alive! He willingly takes on the risk of being connected to us knowing full well of our ability to let him down. Yet, the question before us remains, do we still see the Lord somehow as being in competition with us? That in order for us to give of ourselves to Him, that we somehow have to lose? Or *rather*, are you able to be a burning bush at his service that results in you becoming more alive than ever because of his life radiating in you?

In this holy season of Lent one of the best ways to allow the presence of God to be rekindled within us is to be healed, cleansed, and made whole again through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. It is there, hearing Jesus utter the words of absolution after having confessed our sins, that he sets us aflame with the radiance of his mercy for us to then boldly bear his light into the dark wilderness of our world.


Reflect: Readings and Gospel



Question: What is the difference between mortal and venial sin?

Answer: Sin is a deliberate thought, word, action, or omission contrary to God's law. Since the beginnings of the Church, sin has been distinguished by its gravity. "Grave matter" is traditionally defined by the Ten Commandments. If a person commits a grave sin with full knowledge of the action's evil and with the complete consent of their will, this is a mortal sin. The effects of mortal sin are grave – the loss of sanctifying grace, which can be restored by a fresh outpouring of God's mercy in the sacrament of Reconciliation.

Venial sin does not fit one or more of these conditions (for example, a less serious matter still freely chosen or grave matter committed while under force or ignorance of God's law). The effects of venial sin – while still damaging to the human heart and human society – are less severe. Even so, smaller sins build habits, which can obstruct our growth in virtue. When we are serious about following Jesus, we should do our best to avoid all sin, whether large or small! ©LPi

The Annunciation Of The Lord

The Annunciation of the Lord refers to the angel Gabriel's visit to young Mary to tell her that she would be the mother of Jesus. Mary's acceptance of her pregnancy made her the first to believe in Jesus and, thus, the first Christian. The Annunciation is not a Holy Day but observed on Tuesday March 25th.
