From Fr. Brendan Foley

The challenge of our readings this Sunday is one that invites us to contemplate the transformative power of God's peace and the necessity to live with docility to the guidance of the Spirit. Acts 15, the first reading, is a critical moment in the life of the first disciples. We encounter the Church grappling with division over whether the new gentile converts must also follow Jewish customs, specifically circumcision. The apostles and elders, guided by the Holy Spirit, convene to address this con-

flict. We can learn from how they address this issue, how they handle the solution, and we can even take great comfort in realizing the fact that there has never been a time in the history of the Church where there weren't challenges and difficult subjects needing to be addressed.

The result reflects a biblical truth that is still relevant today. While their ancestors were called to live the covenant as God's chosen people with the law of Moses, time and again they found themselves observing merely the external components of this relationship without continuity in the interior disposition of their hearts. In other words, often the discord within the heart impacted the genuineness of their practice of the faith. And so, rightly the apostles discern that the matter of living the faith must move beyond simply observing practices and laws. It is also deeply concerned with the conversion of the heart that should naturally inform the actions or expression of one's faith. Our lives as disciples should reflect an integrated, holistic life that gives and receives from our communion with the heart of God and the truth of the Gospel. The faith is intended to be something that we live and breathe, not just something we do here and there, and it's because the Lord desires for us to live in his peace and abundance.

The gospel again today presents Jesus offering us a tender promise: those who love Him will keep His word, and the Father and Son will come to dwell within. This intimate indwelling is paired with the gift of the Holy Spirit, who will teach and remind the disciples of Jesus' words. The peace Jesus offers is not worldly but a deep, abiding assurance that transcends fear. Peace in the spiritual life is not merely a sense of comfort or an absence of conflict or finding answers to our questions, but rather it is the upward movement of our soul to love God more. It is true that you can abide in this kind of peace, and have access to the abundance of divine life, while simultaneously facing great hardships and difficulties in life. "Peace" that Jesus offers is quite sincerely the gift of himself, which teaches us that we can't just create or force this to come, but through the help of the Holy Spirit we come to receive this more and more as we turn and ask for it with humble and trusting hearts. The disciples experienced the truth while discerning with the Holy Spirit and followed after even though there were differing opinions of what the answer to their question should be.

Together, these readings weave a tapestry of love, unity, and divine guidance. They call us to live as a community that reflects our ongoing commitment to conversion of interiority of heart, to trust in the Spirit's ability to give divine wisdom, and the call for us to anchor our lives in the peace of Christ. As we navigate our own challenges, may we embody this vision, becoming beacons of God's light in a world longing for hope.




Pray For Vocations

When John has a vision of heavenly Jerusalem, he sees walls.

"A massive, high wall," to be more precise. In the modern lexicon, walls have a negative connotation; we use them as metaphors for all that is exclusionary and rigid. But throughout much of history, walls have meant something very different. In the ancient world, walls meant safety.

Walls meant peace.

"My peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you," Jesus tells his disciples in today's Gospel. "Not as the world gives do I give it to you."

So what's the difference between the peace we know in the world, and the peace we know in Christ?

Well, I would argue that the difference is that the peace we know in Christ exists. We know no real peace in this world. Sometimes, we witness a sort of mirage of peace - something like it, but just a little off, and always on the horizon, never within reach.

Peace, to me, means rest. It means quiet. It means the absence of confrontation, of conflict, of anxiety. But I can't actually experience any of that in this life, not in a substantial way. I can rest - but I never really feel rested. I can retreat to a room by myself to have silence, but someone always knocks on the door, and even if they don't, my thoughts get pretty loud.

And boy oh boy, are those thoughts full of confrontation. Full of anxiety, full of conflict. Wherever I go to find peace, the world finds *me* and banishes it.

I think of the walls of heavenly Jerusalem, so high and so sturdy, guarded so scrupulously by God's strongest angels. These walls are not barriers. They are shields. They are arms, encircling us, gathering us in.

In Christ alone can we find peace in this world. ©LPi
