From Fr. Brendan Folev

Catechism of the Catholic Church #683: "To be in touch with Christ, we must first have been touched by the Holy Spirit. He comes to meet us and kindles faith in us."

From the preface at Mass today: "For bringing your Paschal Mystery to completion, you bestowed the Holy Spirit today on those you made your adopted children by uniting them to your Only Begotten Son. **This same Spirit, as the Church**

came to birth, opened to all peoples the knowledge of God and brought together many languages of the earth in profession of the one faith..."

Pentecost Sunday recalls an incredible and pivotal moment for the life of the Church and for us as members of the body of Christ—we must not miss it. Over the past several Sundays we've been receiving the consolation and encouragement from Jesus' words that remind us of his assurance to remain with us always, through the promised Holy Spirit that was to come. This is not something to be taken lightly, but really, the gift and activity of the Holy Spirit is precisely our foundation for even having a relationship with God, because it is the gift of God himself: "Brothers and sisters: No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord,' except by the Holy Spirit" (1 Cor. 12:3b), "The Advocate, the Holy Spirit whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you" (John 14:26). The confidence of God's closeness to us all throughout our lives is only possible because of this promised gift that came to us in the moment of Pentecost. It is the ongoing desire of the heart of God to continue to pour his love into our hearts through the Holy Spirit (Romans 5:5). Why? Because only through the presence of God, the presence of the Holy Spirit, is it possible for us to intimately know God and to be transformed by such knowledge. This is pure gift! God in his goodness has revealed himself and has invited us to know him sincerely. How do we grow in knowledge of God? How do we come to receive more from this promised Holy Spirit?

A little more from Scripture if you would permit me! In the Gospel of John, Jesus says, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink. As the scripture has said, 'Out of the believer's heart shall *flow rivers of living water*.' Now he said this about the Spirit, which believers in him were to receive" (John 7:37-39) and "...whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life." (John 4:14) "...the Spirit too comes to the aid of our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but the Spirit itself intercedes with inexpressible groanings" (Romans 8:26. What should we make of all this? The Holy Spirit is the breath of God that gives us life at every second of our existence, and because of this goodness we are never left to journey our lives alone. Let's ask for the grace today that we be willing to be docile to this Spirit, that we might be greater disposed to trust and follow after wherever the Lord leads us, knowing that He is always leading us deeper in unity with him, for there is our surest refuge.

I was a full-grown adult before I realized that Pentecost is known as "the birthday of the Church," and it only resonated with me because someone showed up to a church function with cake and candles. Leave it to buttercream frosting to drive home a theological reality I had been missing for 25 years.

I knew what Pentecost was, of course. It simply went over my head that, despite all the incredible, world-changing things that had come *before* the moment of Pentecost, prior to this day, the Apostles were just a group of guys in a room. It wasn't until Pentecost that they became the Church.

So what makes the Church...well, the Church, capital C? What makes it more than just a group of guys in a room?

It's true, they were a very special group of guys. They had the Truth — capital T. They had borne witness to Christ's miracles, to his life and to his passion and death.

But they were still in that room.

When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they received graces and gifts that made them fit to carry out the Great Commission. The Truth wasn't enough, even with a capital T. They needed the Spirit — capital S — and more than that, they needed to receive it with the courage and faith necessary to do what needed to be done.

To get up and leave the room.

Because what good is any of it unless they leave the room? What does it matter, the tongues of fire and the miraculous bilingualism and, frankly, the coming of the Spirit, if no one ever hears about

Missionary Visit -Propagation of the Faith

A little background on the visiting Missionary to SJB/HT on Sunday June 15th.

"The Society of Divine Vocations, also known as the VOCATIONIST FATHERS, is a religious congregation founded by Saint Justin Maria of the Holy Trinity, in Pianura, Naples – Italy in 1920. Saint Justin also founded the Vocationist Sisters and Apostles of Universal Sanctification. The Vocationist Fathers' main charism is "identifying and fostering vocations to the priesthood and religious life, especially among the less privileged". We work in Vocationaries, parishes, schools, and missions. Our missionary spirit currently serves God's people in Italy, Brazil, the U.S.A., Argentina, Nigeria, the Philippines, India, Madagascar, Colombia, Ecuador, Indonesia, the United Kingdom, and Chile. Saint Justin said, "A Vocationary is a religious house where, in a spirit of prayer and study, we educate and guide – free of charge – candidates who wish to dedicate themselves to a life of service to the Lord, but who are not oriented yet towards diocesan priesthood or religious congregations."

Devotions Explained Prayer Before Meals

Anyone who has ever dined in a Catholic home has probably heard the prayer before meals that begins with the famous words: "Bless us, O Lord, and these thy gifts." These words in par-



ticular are first found in the Galesian Sacramentary, a book of Christian liturgy that dates to the seventh or eighth century, but the practice of praying before meals is Biblical, harkening back to the Jewish ritual washing of hands before eating. In the Gospels, Jesus is shown praying before the Last Supper and other meals, setting an example followed by Paul in Acts 27:35.

In his 2015 encyclical *Laudato SI'*, Pope Francis urged the faithful "to return to this beautiful and meaningful custom."

"That moment of blessing," he wrote, "reminds us of our dependence on God for life; it strengthens our feeling of gratitude for the gifts of creation...(and) reaffirms our solidarity with those in greatest need." ©LPi
