## From Fr. Brendan Foley

We have a pair of readings before us this Sunday that involve human beings hosting and providing a meal for God—Abraham in our Genesis reading, and Mary and Martha for Jesus in our Gospel. It's an interesting prospect...is it really possible for us to "do God a favor" by giving him a nice meal? It is true that God graciously accepts our offerings and our generosity of service, but really (in general) it's not about what we can do for God, it's so much more about what God in his goodness does for us. And so Jesus' words are very important for us today...because regardless of our state in

life, regardless of how busy or overwhelmed we might feel, and regardless if we more often find ourselves alone or feeling the weight of isolation, Jesus says today that only one thing is necessary.

What is that one thing? **Find yourself at his feet**. Eyes fixed on him. Nothing else matters more than this. Be at his feet. Certainly hospitality is beautiful and important, Martha's concern for service is absolutely valid, we even see on display Abraham and Sarah's generous hospitality as being something blessed by the Lord. Yet still, focus on Jesus' words as he says only one thing is **necessary** (cf. Luke 10:42, Vulgate "unum est necessarium.")

When we become convinced of the truth of these words there is **both** a challenge and a consolation. First, the challenge is that it can be very difficult to surrender to the reality that we can't be as 'in control' of everything in our life as we'd like to be. Even when we find ourselves overcome with anxieties or demands on our hearts, the *most* important thing we can do is be recollected to the presence of Jesus, to be at his feet, whether that means physically before the Eucharist, or in the silence of wherever we find ourselves...this is a challenge because our lives and our time and what occupies our minds are real and often divide us interiorly, and this is true even of good things, work, relaxation etc. but the purpose of this Gospel is that only one thing is truly NEEDED for life as Jesus says, and that's being at his feet/keeping our eyes fixed on him (again this doesn't mean that there aren't other important things, other good things, etc., but communion with Him is the single most important thing that is NEEDED in our life.)

Second, the comfort is that Jesus, from the sincerity of his heart, is trying to free us from being too consumed with things in our life both—yes even the things that are important to worry about, even the places where our service is vitally important...at the end of the day, we are being invited to trust that if Jesus is Lord of all, if God is allowed to be God, then we can rest assured that the Lord desires our good, that his loving providential care is in fact guiding us and protecting us and our loved ones at all times. This is where we can receive real consolation, the only thing necessary is to find ourselves at Jesus' feet.

But the goodness of God lies in the fact that even this is gift: because by keeping our attention holding our heart, our energy, our focus, Jesus is filling us with his presence SO THAT when we return to those areas of service, when we return to living out our vocation wherever we are, we are strengthened by JESUS' presence to serve better than we simply could've done on our own, because it will be Jesus living his life in us. So I encourage you to let Jesus hold you in his presence, please follow your hunger and let yourself take time to be at his feet to gaze upon him, to allow his word to permeate your heart, and find true, authentic, peace that only Jesus can give—he promises to sustain you for the whole of life.


# A Family Perspective Family Life Education July 4th

#### Recognize God In Your **Ordinary Moments** By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman Martha's Burdens

It's time to admit it: I've been unfair to Mary in the past. Been a little catty about

her. Oooh, Mary, she's so holy. Well, do you like to eat, Mary? Who made your lunch? Yeah, that's right: it was Martha. Because you know what? It's the Martha's who get things done in the world while the Mary's lounge around reading Aquinas and attending silent retreats and going to Eucharistic Adoration whenever they want.

And there you have it, folks: my bitterness on full display! I tend to identify with Martha, not with Mary, and I need to stop doing

Because I am not Martha instead of Mary. I am both. We are all hoth

Mary was a woman; she was expected to do the serving, too. She shared that burden; she wasn't abandoning it, heaping her portion on Martha. And it's so wrong to assume that Mary didn't have the same cares and anxieties as Martha — perhaps she even had

Here's the difference: Mary, unlike Martha (and me, I guess) knew where to go with them.

We typically see our burdens as an impediment to a relationship with Christ. I'm so busy. I'm so overwhelmed. There are so many demands on me, on my time, on my person, on my finances. Take a number, Jesus. Get in line. But we're thinking the wrong way. Burdens aren't an obstacle that stands between us and Christ. Burdens are the straightest path to his feet.

God knows about burdens, okay? Aside from being all-wise and all-knowing, he basically completed a doctorate in suffering, taking on a human form (itself kind of a burden, if you think about it) and for 33 years lived among the hardest and heaviest burdens this world has to offer.

Why did he do this? Well, part of the reason was so that we could finally understand that our burdens aren't a barrier between us and God. On the contrary, they connect us to him.

Are you anxious about many things? Then you need to be right where Mary is: at the feet of Jesus, with all your burdens. ©LPi



## **Devotions Explained** St. Bridget Prayers, Explained!

St. Bridget of Sweden (d. 1373) was a noblewoman of the Middle Ages whose renowned mysticism centered on the passion of Christ. A mother of eight and an attendant at the royal



court in Sweden, as a widow she founded the Order of the Most Holy Savior, advocated for reform in the church and for the return of the Pope to Rome from France.

The St. Bridget Prayers refer to 15 prayers attributed to Bridget which evoke the imagery of Christ's suffering and death, plead for the forgiveness of the supplicant's sins, for a happy death, for fear and love of the Lord, and for a renunciation of worldly desires.

For many years, these prayers were associated with divine promises, though in 1954 the Catholic Church declared that it could not be said that these promises were of supernatural origin. The prayers themselves remain beloved and popular devotions to Christ's passion. ©LPi

#### Mary Magdalene

**Question:** July 22 is the feast of Mary Magdalene. I've heard a lot of stories about her, but who was she really?



Answer: Mary Magdalene has been the subject of speculation and scholarship over the last 2,000 years. Mary Magdalene makes her first named appearance in Luke 8:2. She is one of several women following Jesus. Luke specifically mentions that Mary had previously been delivered from demonic possession. Whatever her life looked like before she met Jesus, it wasn't good! Because of this association with being a repentant sinner, Mary Magdalene has been associated with other similar stories in the Gospel, such as the woman caught in adultery or the woman who bathes Jesus' feet with her tears.

Mary Magdalene shows up again by name at the end of the Gospels, when she stands with the Blessed Virgin Mary at the foot of the Cross. Mary is also present in the garden of the resurrection. She is one of the woman who goes to bring spices to Jesus' tomb, where they find the stone rolled away. Mary stays in the garden weeping, believing his body has been stolen. Jesus approaches her and calls her by name, and she becomes the first witness to the resurrection! While many of the details of Mary Magdalene's life have been lost to time, she is an example of powerful conversion, deep faith, and intimate love for Christ. ©LPi
