This is the last time to be able to greet you before our celebration of Christmas! Please know how I am always overwhelmed by your generosity and kindness to me, and I'm grateful to be journeying with you all. We know how time quickly passes us, and after blinking, our Advent season is dwindling. You will soon be invited anew into the consola-

tion of the profound reality heralded in the Gospel: Motivated by unfathomable love, the Lord of the universe took on our human flesh to dwell among us, and because of this truth, everything has changed. Pope Benedict writes, "Again and again [the beauty of this Gospel] astonishes us that God makes himself a child so that we may love him, so that we may dare to love him, and as a child, he trustingly lets himself be taken into our arms." Incredible the heart of God that he would entrust his life to us in this way.

We will hear joyfully on the morning of Christmas, "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him who brings glad tidings, announcing peace, bearing good news, announcing salvation, and saying to Zion, "Your God is King!" (Is 52:7). We often speak of our faith as being incarnational, meaning that it is something fleshly, something we must embody—the unseen aspects of our faith and of our spiritual life must become a living force in us and through us. For someone outside of the Church to truly receive the Good News that we announce in this celebration, this Truth must inform the way we live and the way we speak. The responsibility is entrusted to all of us to be the feet of the Gospel and to bear the Good News in and to the world that has forgotten or neglected it.

Pope St. Paul VI describes this for us well: "The task of evangelizing all people constitutes the essential mission of the Church. It is a task and mission which the vast and profound changes of present-day society make all the more urgent. Evangelizing is in fact the grace and vocation proper to the Church, her deepest identity. She exists in order to evangelize" [or to become heralds of this message to all]. Earlier in Advent Paul's Letter to the Romans makes this hit home for us: "May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to think in harmony with one another, in keeping with Christ Jesus, that with one accord you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ." (Rom 15:5-6). We are challenged by Christmas, by the Incarnation of the Lord, that each of our very lives must bear the 'fragrance of Christ' and proclaim the joy of the Gospel.

Let us not for a moment take for granted that Christmas day we celebrate the birth of our Savior who really took on our flesh and really became incarnate in the womb of Mary. We shouldn't let the sentimentality or gift-giving of this celebration overshadow the reality of this moment. Jesus bore our flesh and spent months in Mary's womb, his heart beat within her, and upon his birth God allowed himself to be completely dependent on her care. Our humanity is forever elevated because of the humility of God. The closeness of God now to us through Jesus' life in the flesh reveals to us now what is possible when the divinity of God enters us and transforms. When the Gospel and the Sacraments change our lives, Jesus continues his life in our flesh. He has done this from no other motivation but pure love. May the Lord richly bless you and your loved ones with joy this Christmas.

Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman The First Transfiguration



I imagine Joseph waking up the morning after the dream, blinking in the dim half-light of the dawn.

One day, decades from now, the baby his wife carries will stand on a mountaintop. His face will shine like the sun, and those who look upon him will fall down upon their own faces in fear.

We call this the transfiguration, and Joseph won't be there to see it. But that doesn't matter. What those men will learn on the mountaintop, Joseph already knows. He learned it last night.

Today, he shrugs off the remnants of slumber and stands up.

"Rise, and do not be afraid." This is what the baby — a baby no longer, but a man now, one in the last days of his life — will say to his companions on the mountain a few decades from now. They will look up to see him standing there the same as he always was, and they will realize that he did not change at all. They did.

"Do not be afraid." This is what the angel said last night as he revealed to Joseph the will of God: that Joseph take Mary and the Child as his own, despite having so many reasons not to do so. And today Joseph wakes up and the world is the same as it always was: Mary is pregnant, and the Child does not belong to him.

No, the world has not changed. Joseph has.

He rises, and goes to Mary.

The Nativity of the Lord

Take a moment to contemplate the symbols of the season. The crèche tells us the Gospel stories: first from Luke, which details the human birth in a lowly stable and the angels' message to shepherds; and later from Matthew, which describes the arrival of Magi who signify that God's salvation extends to all. The angels stand as heralds of the good news, an emblem for each of us on this solemn feast of our own duty to spread the message that Christ is born and saves us from our sins. The tree stands as a symbol of life, its green branches unfading even in the winter cold, just as God's life remains in us even though our human form should die. The wreath made of evergreens reminds us that God is one, without beginning or end. The candles recall the birth of him who is forever the Light of the world. Today, we celebrate the fact that God came to earth as a beautiful, innocent infant who rejects no one. We rejoice this day in the birth of Christ! And tonight, we remember that Jesus Christ came into this world quietly, humbly, and gracefully, an example of how we should live our lives.
