

As we celebrate the Feast of the **Holy** Family, we may be very aware of how far we and our families have yet to go in living daily holiness. Some very beautiful (albeit, difficult!) practical advice for our families in our options for readings today. In Wisdom literature from Sirach: "He who obeys his father brings comfort to his mother...Take care of your fa-

ther when he is old; if his mind fail, be considerate of him; Even St. Paul, has a fantastic mission statement for our homes: Put on heart-felt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another, above all put on love.

But, to be sure, these words say nothing specific about **holiness**...anyone can do these things, you don't need to be a person of faith to take care of your parents, or to be compassionate, to forgive someone. All these are very good things and in fact we too as people of faith are supposed to do them...but is it what makes us **holy?** Again, today we have before us the family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. What is it about them as a whole that makes them holy?

Observing the early parts of the narratives in the gospel accounts it seems it is their collective **faithful**, and **loving obedience** to the will of the Father is what makes their new little family **holy**. They recognize the priority of God in their life. They recognize God's purposes are more important than their own. Even when they have their plans changed, like their flight to Egypt, or the presentation of Jesus in the temple.

Mary received the message from the Angel, and her "yes" was her faith and trust that God would not leave her alone. We see the same with Joseph, obedience and trust to the messages of the Angel. He protected Mary, his wife, he brought her and the child Jesus safely away from the threat of Herod. By their actions Joseph and Mary reveal to us their willingness to be obedient and to trust God no matter what daunting or difficult situation lies before them. They come to see that it is possible for the Lord to bless them, even when it seems impossible. This posture is what holiness looks like, and the more we adopt this posture in our hearts the more we will see ourselves aware of God's constantly abiding presence.

We often hear obedience and think powerlessness, unable to do what we want to do. Or we hear obedience and think slavery. But it's quite the opposite. The root of the word obedience, Obedire in Latin means TO LISTEN. What makes the Holy Family *Holy?* Their existence is entirely one of openness to *listen* to God. So what about us? Wrapping up 2025 as a family gathered in worship. We know well that 'love'--especially within the family-is intimately tied to sacrifice. In this digital age when we are glued to phones and to the internet, we also are growing in our appreciation for what *real presence* is in relationships, and what it is not. Almost painfully made aware of this. And that's a good thing.

Faith in our family doesn't make life perfect but rather it mysteriously makes life beautifully possible. This feast offers an answer to our stressed out chaotic homes and lives: the School of Nazareth. Jesus, Mary and Joseph: they teach us that priority belongs to loving God—family is strongest, family is unbreakable **when trusting in God is our foundation.** And here, in a very unique way, the Church is always our family, especially when we gather to celebrate the Eucharist. LOVE, PRESENCE, SACRIFICE—this is the recipe for a *holy family*. And it is also happens to be what constitutes the Eucharist. A very blessed and healthy 2026 to you and your loved ones!

Recognize God In Your **Ordinary Moments** By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman **Other Plans**



I don't know exactly what kind of life Mary and Joseph envisioned when they were first

betrothed — back in those simple times when they were just like any other couple who had hopes, dreams and no angels telling them what to do.

Whatever their plans were, I think it's safe to say that the future God had in store for Mary and Joseph was not one either of them expected. I would imagine they both anticipated something a little quieter. A little more stable (no pun intended). A little less tumultuous.

It exhausts me simply to read through the chaos of their movements in today's Gospel. Flee to Egypt, return to Israel (but not Judea! Herod's son is there! Divert to Galilee! Divert!). Settle in Nazareth (let me remind you, this is all happening with a baby in tow, and without the aid of a minivan). Take a deep breath, but don't get too comfortable — now it's almost time to lose your kid in Jerusalem. Then you'll have about 20 years off before he starts raising people from the dead, and that's when things start to get really crazy.

The story of the Holy Family is the ultimate example of the phrase "God had other plans." If any four-word sentence encapsulates what we can expect from the Christian life, it is this.

I thought I was meant for that job, but God had other plans. I thought I would live in this place, but God had other plans. I thought I was supposed to become this person, but God had other plans.

We can do all the right things. We can make all the right choices. We can say, over and over again until our voice wears out, "Thy will be done." But all we can know for sure is that God has other plans. ©LPi

The Giving Wagon will end today Sunday December 28th. Thank you all for your generosity to the All Faith Food Wagon.



"What was my first word? Who was there when I was born? When did I start to walk? Which toys did I play with? What made me cry when I was a baby?"

My oldest has reached the age where she has started to ask questions like this. As she grows up, she is realizing that, in order to understand the world around her, she must first understand herself. This makes her insatiably curious about her own identity, her history — her "origin story," as they say in the movies.

I've got most of it documented either in writing or in photos, but even if it's a detail that wasn't scribbled in a baby book or saved to my digital cloud, it's a memory that I can quickly summon and make real for her as we snuggle and talk about who she was, who she is, and who she may become.

I'm the mom. I have kept all of these things in my heart.

The Blessed Mother knew more about God before opening a book than most of us could discover after a lifetime of study and prayer. There is no one whose knowledge of Christ was so intimate, so deep, so simultaneously ordinary and extraordinary, as the human woman who bore him, birthed him, nursed him, raised him and eventually gave him up.

In the way that I can tell my daughter everything there is to know about the part of her life she cannot recall, Mary can tell us everything we need to know about Christ. All we have to do is ask.

Devotions Explained St. Gertrude's Prayer, Explained!

St. Gertrude's Prayer is a petition said on behalf of the Holy Souls of Purgatory, offering the Blood of Christ in reparation for the sins of the departed.



St. Gertrude, often called "St. Gertrude the Great," was a Benedictine nun who lived in 13th-century Saxony, present-day Germany. A mystic, she received visions of Christ beginning at the age of 25. She was also a prolific writer and devotee of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and is often invoked as an intercessor for the Holy Souls of Purgatory. Her feast day is celebrated on November 16.

The St. Gertrude Prayer reads: "Eternal Father, I offer You the most precious blood of thy Divine Son, Jesus, in union with the Masses said throughout the world today, for all the Holy Souls in Purgatory, for sinners everywhere, for sinners in the universal Church, for those in my own home, and in my family. Amen." ©LPi
