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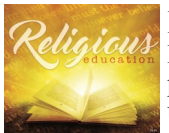
From Fr. Brendan Foley

Your words, Lord, are Spirit and life! (Psalm 19). On September 30, 2019, the feast of St. Jerome (d. 420), Pope Francis shared with the Church his desire for the third Sunday in Ordinary Time each year to be a day dedicated “to the celebration, study and dissemination of the word of God.” Appropriately chosen on that day because St. Jerome most famously reminds us of a deep truth which he allowed to govern his life: “Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ.”

If we want to grow deeper in our relationship with the Lord and better know who he is and how to recognize his voice, we might consider how much time we sit with His Word before our eyes, minds, and heart open to receive. Because there, in that space, we come into direct contact with God’s self-revelation. Dei Verbum is a treasured document of the church that explains what it means for God to make himself known to us in the Scriptures: *“For in the sacred books, the Father who is in heaven meets His children with great love and speaks with them; and the force and power in the word of God is so great that it stands as the support and energy of the Church, the strength of faith for her sons, the food of the soul, the pure and everlasting source of spiritual life. Consequently these words are perfectly applicable to Sacred Scripture: “For the word of God is living and active” (Heb. 4:12) and “it has power to build you up and give you your heritage among all those who are sanctified”.* Every time the word of the Lord is open before us, his words (living and active!) provide us with consolation and direction needed for **today**.

Our Gospel today can invite us into that reflective space to ponder what it was like to receive Jesus' words calling the disciples to a new life. *“Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men.” At once they left their nets and followed him.* So transformed by his word, his call, his invitation--something so profoundly compelling to follow wholeheartedly. If you haven't yet had this encounter, or if you deeply hunger to be renewed by such a Word, we must simply ask the Lord in prayer: **Speak Lord, your servant is listening.**

Growing in familiarity with God’s word invites us daily, and deeper into the heart of God. What does it say about the heart of God for us, if he is solely intent on offering his very life for us to have eternal access to him to liberate us from our captivity or enslavement to sin, or to give us renewed sight, or to instill within us eternal hope? How will you respond? May our hearts be fertile soil to receive the seed of God’s word planted anew within us, and may this jubilee year be a merciful one in which our lives are transformed into signs of hope leading others to the joys of eternal life. **Your words, Lord, are Spirit and life!**

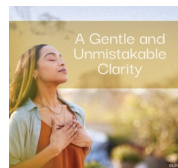

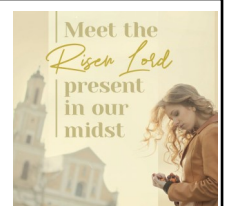

Virtues Explained

Patience, Explained! In treating others with a spirit of patience, **said Pope Francis**, we “look at them ... with God’s gaze, knowing how to distinguish their faces from their faults.”



“Rushing and impatience are enemies of spiritual life,” he continued. “God is love, and those who love do not tire, they are not irascible; they do not give ultimatums. God is patient, God knows how to wait.”

Patience is sometimes referred to as being “annexed” to the moral virtue of fortitude. In practicing patience, we bear any kind of suffering for a greater good. St. Thomas Aquinas describes patience as a means to “safeguard the good of reason against sorrow, lest reason give way to sorrow” (Sum. II-II, 136, Art. 1).

The virtue of patience is a fruit of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5:22), and as Christians who have received the Holy Spirit we are called to “be patient in tribulation” (Romans 12:12) and to “preach the message (of Christ) ... with great patience” (2 Timothy 4:2). ©LPi

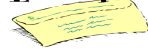
